#### SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR LITERARY HISTORY

The Institute is organized and sponsored by the Department of English for the purpose of addressing important questions and issues in literary history. Each Institute has two components: a conference featuring presentations by distinguished scholars, and a graduate seminar taught by the directors of the Institute.

The 1994 Institute is being directed by Andrew Lakritz and Keith Tuma, assistant professors in the Miami University Department of English. Lakritz has published articles on American modernist poetry, literary theory, and feminist criticism; he is currently completing *Uncommon*Grounds, on identification and difference in literary and cultural texts, and Natural Histories, a Benjaminian study of Robert Frost, Wallace Stevens, and Marianne Moore. Tuma has published articles on modern and contemporary American and British poetry and on the construction of national identity in theories and histories of the avant-garde: he is currently completing Fishing By Obstinate Isles: British Modernist Poetry and American Readers while co-editing the forthcoming Mina Loy: Woman and Poet (The National Poetry

#### THE CONFERENCE

With the introduction of new methodologies in literary study and the increasing popularity of cultural studies, the content of the typical academic essay or book has begun to look very different from what it might have looked like just a few years ago. But even as we redefine

the objects and goals of scholarship, our essays and books, considered as writing, are often as boring and predictable as ever. With its main point of reference being the work of poet-critics for whom the act of writing criticism is coextensive with the practice of an art, this conference will be devoted to discussions of the discursive modes of critical writing, with special attention being paid to experiments in criticism that explode conventional genres and categories. Featured speakers will address the conventions of criticism, the history of poet-critics, and the possibilities of imagining a new critical prose from their own perspectives as poets, scholars, critics, and theorists. Each presentation will include an opportunity for questions and comments; small group discussions will facilitate interactions among all conference participants. A panel discussion will conclude the conference. The conference fee is \$35.00.

### THE GRADUATE SEMINAR

Between May 16 and June 4, the Institute directors will offer a graduate seminar on the work of canonical and contemporary poet-critics. Searching for ways in which the poet-critic might be "reinvented" as a model for critical practice, the seminar will try to identify the strengths and weaknesses of various poet-critics, the kinds of questions that have typically preoccupied them, and the ways in which their discursive modes can be thought of as opposed to the conventions of professional critical discourse. Students in the seminar will attend the conference and meet with the sneakers.


